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Croatia Agricultural Trade 1998

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Report Highlights:

It is expected that Croatia will become a WTO member by the end of 1999, which will result in a significant decrease in trade barriers. Croatia has signed "Free Trade Agreements" with Slovenia and Macedonia, while negotiations are underway regarding the signing of a new "Free Trade Agreement" with Bosnia & Herzegovina. The GOC does not implement any type of export subsidies for agricultural and food products.

Croatian agriculture is characterized by three distinct agro-ecological zones: Pannonian Lowlands, Central Mountain Zone, and Mediterranean Zone. There are 3.01 million hectares of agricultural land, of which 1.84 million hectares are arable and the remaining comprises pastures, lakes, marshes, and fishponds. During the last few years agricultural trade balance in Croatia has been characterized by large scale imports of agricultural and food products, even though it is endowed with rich natural resources.

There are a number of reasons for which this situation has arisen: production structure (lack of modern management and production systems, average farm size 3.0 hectares), large scale war devastation in the 1991-1995 period, loss of traditional markets, low level of GOC support for the agricultural subsector and lack of integration into the World agricultural commodities markets.

It is evident from Table 1. that during most years Croatia has been a cereal, beverage and alcohol, and tobacco and fish (fish cans) exporter. At the same time Croatia also imported significant quantities of oilseeds, fruits, vegetables, live animals, meat, and dairy products.

The primary Croatian suppliers of agricultural products are Italy, Slovenia, Germany, and Austria. The primary export markets are Bosnia & Herzegovina, Slovenia, Italy, Germany, and select CEFTA countries. Croatian agricultural trade is largely accounted for by EU countries (40%) and CEFTA countries (25%).

In 1998, agricultural imports from the United States amounted 33.84 million US\$ (3.93 % of total 1998 agricultural imports) which represents a significant increase compared to 1996 (1.7% of total). Croatian exports amounted to 7.66 million US\$ (1.57 % of total 1998 agricultural imports) in 1998. The leading Croatian import items were cereals and oilseeds (64% of total imports), while the major Croatian export items were pork, other meat, and fish products.
