Food and Agricultural Import Regulations and Standards Report

FAIRS Export Certificate Report

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Report Highlights:

France as a member of the European Community has implemented EU regulations for the import of animal and plant products. The US export certification requirements for most products destined for the EU have been harmonized, but a few products not yet harmonized are subject to French national regulations.

France as part of the European Community has implemented EU regulations for the import of products of animal and plant origin and therefore export certification requirements for most products destined for the EU market have been harmonized. A few products not yet harmonized are subject to French national regulations. Check with <u>France 2019 FAIRS report</u> for more details. The competent French authority needs to be consulted on a case-by-case basis to address requirements for non-harmonized products. Imported products must meet existing Member State requirements and products must be accompanied by the proper certification at port of arrival. In general, health certificates are required for all imported products of animal origin and phytosanitary certificates are needed for all plant products that could introduce pests into the EU. In France, food safety is the primary responsibility of Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Export certificates must be in the official language of France, therefore in French.

Usually the importer (or possibly an exporter or a freight forwarder) applies to the authority with all relevant details. There is no set form for this kind of application.

EU food legislation is translated into the 24 official languages in use in the EU-28 (including French) and is published in the Official Journal. The Eurlex website http://eur-lex.europa.eu/en/index.htm provides free access to European Union laws. EU plant and plant product import regulations have been harmonized and are published in a single directive. Unlike veterinary products, there is only one model certificate for all plant products in accordance with international regulations laid out by the International Plant Protection Convention of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations.
