Report Highlights:

Both the Dutch and EU apple markets are saturated with low apple prices. This in contrast to the pear market. The Dutch and EU pear crops are down and prices are bullish. Export prospects for U.S. apples to the Netherlands seem dim, but U.S. pear exporters face good exports.

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Apples

Production

In December of 1999, the Dutch Product Board for Horticulture confirmed their 1999 summer forecast for the Dutch apple production at 507, 000 metric tons (MT). This season, the quality of the fruit is very good but prices are weak as a consequence of over supplied apple markets in western Europe.

The November 1, 1999 apple stocks in a few selected west Europe countries were high and in most cases higher than the year before. These high stocks have a dampening effect on west European apple prices.

Although Dutch apple growers are receiving low prices for their apples, there are apparently few growers going out of business. Research of a large Dutch bank in cooperation with the Dutch Organization of Apple Growers (NFO) revealed that generally it is the smaller farm without a successor in the family that are discontinuing business. According to the NFO, consolidation already took place in 1992 and 1993 when apple prices were extremely low.

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Consumption

In the first half year of 1999, Dutch apple consumption fell 10 percent below the same period in 1996. Dutch apple consumption has been continuously decreasing in recent years. In general fruit consumption is decreasing in the Netherlands, except for summer fruit such as plums, strawberries and cherries etc. It is mostly the younger generation who is eating less fruit.

Trade

Dutch exports of domestically grown apples increased sharply in the first ten months of 1999, compared to the two preceding seasons. Germany imported much larger quantities of processing apples than usual so prices for apples for processing increased to 24 Dutch cts/kilo (5 UScts/lb). German demand for table apples was good. Exports to the U.K. were down because of a larger U.K. apple crop and three large U.K. food retail chains decided to sell domestic apples only. Also, the EU Commission decided that the U.K. apple growers were not eligible for a one million U.S. dollar promotion budget because British growers wanted to promote U.K. apples. EU rules require generic promotion of apples. The weak Russian currency had a detrimental effect on Dutch apple exports to Russia through October of 1999. However, a 25 percent smaller 1999/00 Russian apple crop could help Dutch apple exports this season.

Imports of U.S. apples into the Netherlands depend on EU market prices for apples and the relative supply of red apples in EU markets. Apple prices in the 1999/00 season are expected to be low so the export outlook for U.S. apples to the Netherlands is dim.

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Pears

Total Dutch pear production in 1999/00 is still estimated at 125,000 MT, the smallest crop in five years. Also the total EU crop is down, by seven percent. EU pear markets are bullish.

Trade

The Netherlands is a large importer and exporter of pears. Imports of non-EU pears, mostly for re-exports play an important role in the market. It can be expected that exports of U.S. pears in the 1999/00 season will be at least equal to the 1998/99 season.
