Grain and Feed Update

2000

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Report Highlights:

Favorable rains improved conditions for the 1999/2000 summer grain season and the 1999 corn crop is currently estimated at 8.5 million tons, up 20 percent from 1998. The increase is mainly due to a 10% expansion in the area planted on commercial farms. Some of the unharvested wheat crop was affected by heavy rains in recent weeks. However, the crop situation is unchanged from last month with 2000 wheat imports still estimated at about 600,000 tons.

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Executive Summary

Very good rains since the beginning of December 1999 have persisted to date, enhancing prospects for the 1999 corn crop that is currently maturing. Coupled with a 10% increase in the area planted on commercial farms and an increase in yield, a crop of about 8.5 million tons can be expected, consisting of 8 million tons in the commercial sector and 500,000 tons in the developing sector. This will be well in excess of domestic demand. Local futures prices already reflect the increased crop estimate with a big drop in prices after the start of the harvest in May 2000.

The rains have, however, damaged the quality of the unharvested portion of the wheat crop in the Eastern Free State. The result is that demand for high quality imports to blend with the local supplies remains strong and imports will likely reach 600,000 tons this year.

Production

The new Crop Estimates Committee made a preliminary estimate of the area planted to summer crops on January 20, 2000.

The area planted to corn on commercial farms is 3.205 million hectares, 300,000 hectares or 10% more than in the previous season. The area planted to white corn is 1.998 million hectares (62%) and yellow corn 1.207 million hectares (38%), virtually unchanged from the previous seasons' percentages. The North West Province is the largest producer of white corn with 890,000 hectares, followed by the Free State, 735,000 hectares, and Mpumalanga, 250,000 hectares. The Free State is the largest producer of yellow corn, 450,000 hectares, followed by Mpumalanga 330,000 hectares and North West Province 300,000 hectares.

The increase in the area planted to corn was mainly due to a 45% (371,650 hectares) decrease in the area planted to sunflower which suffered from over production and low prices during the previous season. The following table contains the details:

The Crop Estimates Committee has maintained the 7.1 million ton estimate for the 1998 crop, and we are also using the official crop estimate. We estimate the 1999 crop at 8.5 million tons taking the increase in the area planted on commercial farms into account as well as the very good rainfall to date. The favorable rainfall more than makes up for the late planting but constant wet conditions may lead to disease problems. At this stage a week of sunny weather will be welcome as sunlight hours have been restricted and temperatures generally low. The 1998 yield on commercial farms amounted to 2.13 metric tons per hectare, for the 6.716 million tons produced on 2.905 million hectares. The 1999 yield is forecast at 2.5 metric tons per hectare for the expected 8 million tons crop from 3.205 million hectares. The crop in the developing sector is expected to increase to about 500,000 tons this year after 394,000 tons were produced in the 1998 season. The total crop is thus expected to reach 8.5 million tons.

Trade

Imports of yellow corn to the coastal areas could reach 600,000 tons this marketing year; The U.S. has already supplied 254,000 tons of the corn imports from January to October 1999. Prospects for further imports from the U.S. are favorable after the phytosanitary problems (Stewart wilt) that hampered sales earlier seem to have been resolved.

Production

The fifth official estimate of the 1999 wheat crop is 1.561 million tons but this probably does not reflect the damage the heavy rains have inflicted on the unharvested crop in the Eastern Free State. Persistent rains have hindered the harvest and the wheat is sprouting. This will have a detrimental effect on the quality of the crop, which means that more will go to the feed market while the demand for high quality imported wheat will increase. We still expect that about 600,000 tons will be imported during the year.
