Report Highlights:

On February 8, 2021, the Government of India's Food Safety and Standards Authority (FSSAI) clarified that the implementation of the requirement for a Genetically Modified-Free Certificate for imported food products will apply to all consignments with a bill of lading dated March 1, 2021, and or after. The clarification further informs stakeholders about the permissible tolerance limit for the adventitious presence of genetically modified organisms (i.e., genetically engineered) at one percent. Earlier in its order of August 21, 2020, the FSSAI listed 24 food crops in Annexure 1 that are subject to this requirement.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

On February 8, 2021, the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) published the clarification that its implementation of the requirement for a Genetically Modified-Free Certificate for imported food products will apply to all consignments that are shipped from the exporting country's port with a bill of lading dated on and or after March 1, 2021. The clarification also stipulates the permissible tolerance limit for adventitious presence of genetically modified organisms (i.e., genetically engineered) at one percent (see, Appendix I - FSSAI Clarification – Requirement of Non-GM cum GM-Free Certificate to Accompany Imported Food Consignments – Reg., February 8, 2021).

CLARIFICATION

Subject: Requirement of Non GM cum GM free certificate to accompany imported food consignments – reg.

With respect to order dated 21.08.2020 and 03.12.2020 (copy attached) on the above cited subject, following is clarified:

- The requirement of Non GM cum GM free certificate is applicable to consignments which are despatched from exporting country on or after 1st March, 2021.
- (ii) The tolerance limit for adventitious presence (AP) of GMOs at 1% is permissible in imported food crop consignments as listed in Annexure 1 of the order dated 21.08.2020.
