Japan Moves Closer to Implementing Provisional
Safeguard Measures on Fresh Shiitake Mushrooms,
Welsh Onions and Tatami Mats

Report Highlights:

Major Japanese media reported on March 30 that the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries (MAFF), the Ministry of Finance (MOF) and the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI) are moving towards implementing *Provisional Safeguard Measures* on *fresh shiitake mushrooms*, *welsh onions* and *tatami mats*. Mid-April 2001 is the targeted date for Japan's provisional safeguard measures which would take the form of increased tariffs.

Major Japanese media reported on March 30 that Ministers of the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries (MAFF), the Ministry of Finance (MOF) and the Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI) are moving towards implementing *provisional safeguard measures* on *fresh shiitake mushrooms*, *welsh onions* and *tatami mats*. Reports indicated that ministers, including the Minister of the Foreign Affairs, plan to meet again during the week of April 1 to decide whether Japan will implement *provisional safeguards*. MAFF released the results of its investigations on March 23 (see details below).

If the provisional measures are finalized, in the form of increased tariffs, implementation is likely to occur in mid-April at the earliest, a time frame faster than originally expected. These measures would be the first time Japan has used safeguard measures. The tariff increases will be based on the difference between imported and domestic prices.

These three products were taken from MAFF's emergency fast track "level 2" list. The other products remaining on the "level 2" list are *tomatoes*, *green peppers*, *bulb onions*, *sawn wood and glulam products*. On March 15, MAFF also asked both METI and MOF to start investigation of safeguard measures for *eel* and *wakame seaweed*. According to media reports, imports of eel in last four years increased 52.6% (mostly from China and Taiwan) and imports of wakame seaweed went up 41.0% (mostly from China). The sped-up schedule for implementing safeguard measures reportedly reflects pressure from members of ruling Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) in preparation for the upcoming election for the Upper House scheduled in this summer. The LDP, as evidenced by the single-digit public support levels for the Prime Minister, is facing difficulties in the next election due to Japan's lackluster economic situation and political instability.

In addition, Japan is considering proposing the introduction of a new type of safeguard in the new WTO round. This would be a short, automatic safeguard to deal with perishable and seasonal agricultural products. This would allow Japan more flexibility in responding to its agricultural interests. Regarding market reactions, the Nihon Keizai Shinbun (Japan Economic News) reported that if tariffs were increased under *provisional safeguards*, import levels for these products are expected to be maintained as exporters cut prices. Current tariff rates on welsh onions, fresh shiitake mushrooms and tatami mats are 3%, 4.3% and 6%, respectively. In the case of welsh onions, the average domestic price in 2000 was 206 yen per kilogram, while imported prices averaged 91 yen, half of the domestic price. Production of welsh onions in China is specifically targeted at Japan so China is expected to continue exporting to Japan by cutting prices to offset higher tariffs. Japanese trading firms introduced their farming techniques in China to produce products suitable for the Japanese market.

According to a Japanese trading company, produce traders have no immediate intention to shift to more expensive domestic vegetables. Imported vegetables have established distribution channels for Japan's food service industry, according to media reports and trade contacts.

MAFF's officials are reported to be pressing China to voluntarily restrain exports of these 3 products to Japan. If China complies and restrains their exports of welsh onions, fresh shiitake mushrooms and tatami mats to Japan, Japan will not implement *provisional safeguard* measures, according to media reports.

According to the Agreement on Safeguards (Article 6), Japan appears to be trying to follow the Uruguay Round agreement in its policy efforts on these three products. The agreement states "in critical circumstances where delay would cause permanent damage which it would be difficult to repair, a Member may take *provisional safeguard measures* pursuant to a preliminary determination that there is clear evidence that increased imports have caused serious injury". The measures, which take the form of tariffs, may not exceed 200 days, and must be all refunded if the investigation determines not injury to the domestic industry.
