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Report Name: Poultry Market Update

Country: Bulgaria

Post: Sofia

Report Category: Poultry and Products

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Report Highlights:

Bulgarian broiler production grew by two percent in 2019, while duck meat output decreased sharply by 24 percent from 2018, due to animal health challenges. Consumer demand for poultry meat reached record levels. 2019 chicken meat imports grew by over 10 percent, stimulated by favorable domestic demand. Exports decreased by five percent in favor of domestic sales. Prospects for 2020 are cautiously optimistic and highly dependent on Bulgaria's COVID-19 situation and its effect on the economy and consumer incomes. Despite strong poultry meat retail sales following the novel coronavirus outbreak to date, Post expects that the subsequent shutdown of the food service industry and the decline in tourism sector will negatively affect the poultry demand.



MY2020 Supply and Demand Forecast

Bulgaria's 2019 broiler production expanded by two percent over 2018. Although 2019 chicken stocks began 16 percent higher than 2018, 2019 stock ended four percent lower from 2018 (Table 1). Animal health and related higher biosecurity challenges were drivers of this development.

In February and March 2020, Bulgaria notified eight highly pathogenic avian Influenza (HPAI) outbreaks, mainly on duck farms in the Plovdiv area, which is a key center production. The <u>last</u> outbreak occurred on June 4, in the Plovdiv area on a large layer farm. The Bulgarian Food Safety Agency updated two major regulations (<u>Ordinance 11-252/January, 24, 2020</u> and <u>Ordinance 11-741/March 20, 2020</u>) regarding disease control for poultry farms, introducing more stringent biosecurity standards and stricter surveillance.

The latest data (January-March 2020) indicate stagnant broiler slaughter (0.4 percent increase) and a 42-percent increase in duck slaughter, resulting in 11-percent growth in total poultry meat output over the corresponding period in 2019. Post forecasts that 2020 broiler meat production will stagnate or increase slightly over 2019 due to COVID-19's impact on the economy and trade. Since consumer incomes, food service, and tourism largely drive domestic poultry meat consumption, 2020 demand is likely to decline. Post expects a recovery in local demand and production in 2021.

MY2019 Supply and Demand


<u>Farms</u>: Large farms (over 10,000 birds) registered a decline in stocks (Table 2) while the number of small farms tripled and their stocks increased by almost 500 percent. However, collectively, these farms accounted for only 2.4 percent of Bulgaria's total chicken inventory. Larger farms accounted for 97.6 percent of the total inventory. Vertical integration and export demand continued to shape the industry.

<u>Poultry Meat Supply</u>: In 2019, commercial poultry production stagnated while non-commercial production continued to decline by 13 percent (Graph 1, Tables 4, 5).

Broiler Meat Output: Broiler meat output increased by 2.1 percent and accounted for 78 percent (76 percent in 2018) of commercially produced poultry meat, compared to 17 percent for duck meat (Graph 2, Table 3). The average carcass weight was consistent at 1.7 kg. The market share for cuts expanded and accounted for over 46 percent of broiler meat retail stocks. This trend indicates an increasing demand for value-added and convenience products.


Duck Meat Output: Duck meat output declined substantially by 24.5 percent due to HPAI outbreaks. The decline in duck meat production drove downward the total poultry meat production figure (Table 3).


Consumption

Poultry consumption has increased due to higher purchasing power and the perception that poultry is more healthful. In 2019, consumption reached 186,000 MT, a two-percent increase over 2018 (Table

5). In 2019, local supply accounted for 62 percent of consumption versus 64 percent in 2018 due to stagnant domestic production and higher imports (Graphs 3 and 4). Consumption per capita grew from 11.4 kg/capita in 2018 to 12.0 kg/capita in 2019; the average quantity of purchased poultry meat by a household also increased from 24.0 kg (2018) to 25.1 kg (2019).


In 2020 to date, retail sales of broiler meat have been stable and growing since many consumers have switched to buying less expensive proteins/meats. On the other hand, the shutdown of the food industry outlets has already negatively impacted the sales. Higher-value meats, especially duck meat, is projected to be hit hard and prevent any growth in consumption. Total poultry meat consumption is likely to stagnate or witness a temporary drop followed by a recovery later in 2021.

Graph 4: Poultry Purchased per Household



Trade

Local poultry meat producers target export markets to diversify their risk and increase sales. Imports are dominated by broiler meat, while export revenues come mainly from duck products (Graph 5, Table 6). According to industry sources, 2020 duck meat exports, to date, to primary markets in France and Belgium were hard-hit by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Imports

2019 Bulgarian poultry imports by volume increased by 1.8 percent over 2018 (Table 6), but stagnated by value, at \$135 million. Major suppliers were Poland (40 percent), Romania (18 percent), and Hungary (12 percent).

Broiler meat imports accounted for 94 percent of total poultry meat imports in 2019. Imports grew over 10 percent in volume, but stagnated in value compared to 2018, due to lower average import price. Frozen broiler meat imports in 2019 (HS#020712 and HS#020714) increased by 2.2 percent to 54,000 MT, but its share in total poultry imports was stable at 50 percent. 2019 frozen chicken leg-quarter (CLQ) (HS#020714) imports grew by two percent over 2018 and remained Bulgaria's primary imported poultry product. Frozen CLQ meat accounted for 44 percent (43 percent in 2018) of total broiler meat imports by volume in 2019.

In January-March 2020, broiler meat imports by volume declined by 10 percent, and by six percent in value terms (Eurostat/TDM). Poland continued to be a leading supplier, although its exports to Bulgaria dropped by a half compared to the corresponding period in 2019. Poland was followed by Romania which also reduced its exports to Bulgaria by 26 percent. Conversely, Hungary, and Greece boosted their exports to Bulgaria by double-digit growth.

Exports

In 2019, poultry exports declined by six percent by volume and 23 percent by value to \$158 million, due to lower prices (Eurostat/TDM) (Table 6). Major markets were Greece and Romania for broiler meat, and France and Belgium for duck meat.

Broiler meat exports in 2019 decreased by five percent in tonnage and by 10 percent in value (Eurostat/TDM). Greece was the leading market and accounted for 58 percent of broiler meat exports, and Romania for 12 percent, respectively.

In January-March 2020, broiler meat exports declined 22 percent by volume and 20 percent by value from the same period in 2019. Exports to Greece and the United Kingdom declined while trade with Romania, Italy and North Macedonia saw good growth.

The difference between average prices for broiler meat in Bulgaria and the EU-28 provides an advantage for local exporters. In 2019, the average Bulgarian price was €150.56/100 kg (negative growth rate of -1.8 percent from 2018) compared to €189.77/100 kg for the EU average (negative growth rate of -0.3 percent from 2018). To date in 2020, Bulgarian prices have essentially stagnated. In May 2020, the average Bulgarian price was €147/100 kg (down by 4.3 percent over last year) versus €176/100 kg for the EU average (8.2 percent less than in May 2019).
