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Report Highlights:

Post forecasts that Burmese rice exports will continue to rise in February in anticipation of regular demand from China through official channels, increased broken rice demand from EU countries, continued demand from regional countries, and a rebound in demand form African countries. Domestic prices for both Emata and Shwe Bo Pawsan in February will likely increase as there are less supplies entering the market and strong export demand.

Burmese Rice Production

The Burmese Department of Agriculture (DOA) reported that farmers cultivated roughly 6.08 million hectares of monsoon main rice crop during the MY2021/22 monsoon season and have so far harvested about 91 percent of the total cultivated area as of January. The Burmese DOA expects farmers will plant 0.97 million hectares for the second rice crop in MY2021/22 and are reporting that farmers have planted about 44 percent as of early January 2022.

Non-border Trade

FAS Rangoon (Post) forecasts Burma's official rice and broken rice exports higher in February in anticipation of a rebound in demand from African countries, regular demand from China and the EU, and active demand from the Philippines and regional countries. Post revised the rice export data in December (Table 2) and added official rice exports by type in December in Table 1. Burmese rice exporters have started exporting more rice through maritime trade due to delays at border check points with China. There was strong demand for Burmese rice from Benin, Niger and Burkina Faso in December. Total rice exports by type in January are not available at the time of reporting. Post will include this data in the next report.

Border Trade

Burma's rice and broken rice border trade is still slow due to procedures aimed at preventing the spread of COVID-19 at the Chinese border and reduced trading during the long holiday for the Chinese New Year. Rice exports at the border usually slowdown in last week of January to mid-February during the long holiday (February 1-15). High costs for short distance transportation at the border is still a major challenge for exporters due to a shortage of Chinese trucks. Burmese goods must use Chinese short distant transportation trucks to cross the Kyin San Kyawt border as a COVID-19 precaution. About 140 trucks, including 100 trucks of melons, are shipping across the Kyin San Kyawt check point daily. Roughly 400 trucks were crossing that gate before COVID-19. The Burmese government reported that Burma's export to China through the Muse border between October 2021 and March 2022 declined to about \$1.5 billion compared to \$1.9 billion during the same period last year.

Market Overview

Domestic wholesale prices for both Emata 25 percent broken rice and superior quality Shwe Bo Pawsan increased in February due to lower supply in the domestic market and strong export demand.
