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Report Name: Rice Trade - Monthly

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Report Highlights:

Post forecasts Burmese rice exports lower in July due to reduced domestic supplies and higher domestic prices. Domestic prices for Emata remained high, while prices for Shwe Bo?Pawsan rose due to lower domestic supplies.

Burmese Rice Production

The Burmese Department of Agriculture (DOA) reported that farmers plan to cultivate 6.07 million hectares of main crop rice in marketing year (MY) 2022/23 and have planted about 3.5 percent (212,181 hectares) as of May 31, 2022. The DOA also reported that farmers have cultivated roughly 0.98 million hectares of the second rice crop in MY 2021/22 and have harvested about 70 percent of the second rice crop cultivated area as of May 31, 2022.

Non-Border Trade

Posts forecasts Burma's rice and broken rice exports lower in July due to reduced supplies in the domestic market, higher local prices, and a depreciating Myanmar Kyats (MMK). Rice exporters trade in U.S. dollars (USD) but must convert USD into MMK at the Central Bank's fixed exchange rate of 1,850 MMK/USD. The market exchange rate, however, ranges between 2,170 and 2,185 MMK/USD. Only rice and broken rice already contracted is shipping, and exporters are hesitant to contract new sales due to high domestic prices.

Official export numbers by type and destination for March and April 2022 are provided in Table 1 and 2. Post revised the monthly exports by type found in Table 4 according to the official export numbers. Post also revised rice and broken rice exports for May and June 2022 in Table 4 based on data from the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF) and temporary data from the Ministry of Commerce. Burma exported 0.567 MT of glutinous rice and 2.3 MT of Paw San rice to the United States in March.

Border Trade

Border trade has been slow since mid-2021 due to closures of border gates from COVID-19 prevention measures, high transportation costs, and Chinese import policy changes. Border trade resumed in May with the easing of import procedures. Burmese rice exports through the border remain slow due to high domestic prices and unclear trade policy. The Department of Trade (DOT) released a directive requiring exporters to only accept USD for exports of rice, corn, oilseed crops, beans, and pulses through the border starting July 1, 2022. In addition, exporters must deposit all earnings in the Central Bank. This new directive is making it harder for exporters who must use the Central Bank's fixed exchange rate of 1,850 MMK/USD instead of the market exchange rate that is currently between 2,170 and 2,185 MMK/USD. However, DOT excluded rice and broken rice from the new directive on July 3, 2022, allowing exporters to accept Chinese yuan and Thai baht.

Market Overview

Domestic wholesale prices for Emata 25 percent broken rice remained unchanged in July, while the price for white superior quality Shwe Bo Pawsan rose due to lower supplies. Trade sources confirmed that supplies of Shwe Bo Pawsan rice (rough) in the Sagaing region sold out soon after harvesting as increased conflict between military officials and anti-military forces spurred rice purchases.
